ALIA Health Libraries Section, General Meeting: Report from the Professional Development Officer

BRS Demonstration

The first general meeting for 1992 was held on Tuesday 30 January 1992 amid fine wine and finger food sponsored by BRS, at the CSIRO Biomolecular Engineering Library in Parkville. The Librarian, Lisa Belkin arranged pleasant surroundings, and best of all a telephone line so that the online display went ahead without any of those dreaded technical problems.

The speaker was Russell Kendrick,
Australasian Manager of BRS Information
Technology. Russell gave a very impressive
talk and display on the various on-line data
bases and electronic information services
produced by BRS, and in particular
MEDLINE. BRS are marketing their
MEDLINE with offers such as waiving the
annual password charge for all new
subscribers and charging only US\$20 per
hour connect fee during 1992.

This availability of MEDLINE is becoming a concern to health science librarians as the Australian National Library has announced that after 1993 it will no longer be making it available to libraries. MEDLINE on CD-ROM has been considered as one possible alternative. The most current MEDLINE information has been traditionally available on another American data base DIALOG, yet the increasing cost has made this an expensive alternative. BRS was able to show that they can offer inexpensive, simple, fast and current data bases to Australian libraries...and the librarians at this meeting were impressed!

Editor's Note

For those who are busily contemplating the various alternatives to accessing MEDLINE via the ANL, I have heard (from a source at CD-ROM and Associates) that the last MEDLINE tape will be uploaded during December 1992. We will be able to access the system until June 1993, but no updates from December onwards!

Our next General Meeting will be held at The Walter and Eliza Hall Institute on Thursday 26th March.

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Kevin Ward will speak on "The Changing Role of the Subscription Agent" and include latest overseas developments in the field. There will be an online link up with the DATASWETS database in The Netherlands.

In our traditional style we will preface the meeting with a selection of fine wines and finger food. A detailed notice will be sent to members shortly.

Future Demand!

It is interesting to note future prospects for librarians. The Economic Policy and Analysis Division of the Department of Education, Employment and Technology (DEET) predict librarianship to be one of the major growing occupations. The number of jobs are expected to increase from 9324 in 1986 to 17,194 by the year 2001, an overall increase by 74.3%. Quoting from Margaret Simons' article in The Age, 16/2/92, "Librarians...are more likely to spend their time managing computerised data bases for private companies than fumbling with catalogue cards and dusting off books." [Editorial comment: When are we going to dust off this image - maybe the media needs to be told what we are currently doing!!]

National Library of Medicine Associate Program International Traineeship -1992/93

The National Library of Medicine Associate Program is a one-year postgraduate training experience to prepare librarians for future leadership roles in health sciences libraries. The Associates are introduced to a wide range of technologies and skills utilized in managing information at a national library and providing information services to a country or region. The Program uses a variety of teaching methods to enhance the individual's learning in the work environment.

The NLM is offering one position in the Associate Program to a librarian from outside the United States. The position is open to librarians of non-US citizenship who have an advanced degree, preferably a Master in Library Science or its equivalent, and are currently engaged to work in a medical or health sciences related library information center outside the United States. This opportunity is most beneficial for librarians working in management positions in larger libraries that are using automation and have national or regional responsibilities.

No one should underestimate the importance this NLM offer represents. This program should offer an excellent training opportunity for an individual who has been identified as a future leader in medical librarianship. This is a competitive program;

one individual can be selected each year. VI We hope HLS Members will take advantage of this great opportunity.

Obituary

Anne Harrison 1923 - 1992

A major era for health librarianship in Australia has ended with the death of Anne Harrison on 13th February, 1992.

Anne was friend and a mentor to so many of us who have been working in medical libraries through the period of her influence from the early 1950s to her retirement in 1983. We all feel a deep personal sense of loss.

Anne entered medical librarianship when taking charge of Brownless Library, University of Melbourne. Her vision and her willingness and ability to share her expertise

VIC HE Sittle alth Infalfication for medical libraries throughout Australia.

She established the Central Medical Library Organisation in 1953. This was a pioneering effort in library co-operation and brought a sense of cohesion to the medical library network. Through CMLO many fine schemes have been developed. These have ranged from a clearinghouse and exchange system, which was invaluable in establishing collections for new medical libraries in the early 1950/60s, through to the Union List of Monographs, which preceded NUCOM by nearly 10 years and was an indispensable location tool for scarce resources. Anne played a valuable part in the development of the Australian MEDLINE network. Anne lobbyed enthusiastically for the network and her promotion of the system throughout the medical community ensured its eventual availability as a national network.

In the early 1970s she played a major role in ensuring that the state groups of medical librarians became affiliated with the then Library Association of Australia. She was proud to see her work result in the formation of the Health Libraries Section of the Australian Library and Information Association

The library community acknowledged Anne's great contribution to our profession by conferring the award of Fellowship of ALIA in 1989. Health librarians throughout Australia rejoiced in this official recognition of our debt to a dedicated and most professional colleague.

The Anne Harrison Award, presented biannually to a member of the Health Libraries Section for a special research project in health sciences librarianship, was established in the mid 1980s. It exists as a tangible reminder of our debt to a pioneer in our profession.

We mourn the passing of our friend and mentor. Times and circumstances have changed, but those who knew Anne well will remember her with great affection.

Both librarians exchanged accommodation and household items to make the transition as smooth as possible. Salaries are paid by each librarian's institution.

We hope that this will be a rewarding and fruitful experience for each librarian and that both libraries will gain from the interchange of ideas and procedures.

COMMENT

"Genteel", "weak", "defensive", "tentative": how many of us like to think that the time is long past when this was the dominant image of the librarian? Yet these are all words used to describe current perceptions of librarians in a recent article by Howard Coxon, the South Australian parliamentary librarian (Australian 1/1/92).

Coxon was commenting on the submission made by ACLIS on the National Information Policy which, reportedly, was adopted by the

"because it asked for so little". Coxon went on to reproach librarians for being too slow to press home their advantages with new technology in the information field. While job opportunities in the information field have expanded, librarians have let them slip past so that they are no longer seen as being library-based. In fact, Coxon writes, "librarians... are crippled by false notions of professionalism which restrict the futures of individuals, not to mention their career prospects and salary rewards".

Health librarians tend to be a progressive bunch, taking an active interest in the latest technology and very aware of the need for professional recognition within our organizations to support ongoing development in our libraries. Nevertheless, I wonder how many of Coxon's comments apply to us as well?

There are more issues at stake here than the image of librarians. As a professional group, health librarians need to counter these false ideas of our capabilities, but we need to undertake this in a unified and organized manner. How should we achieve this? Your input on this issue would be appreciated.
