THE STATE OF THE (LIS EDUCATION) NATION

Currently 27 institutions around Australia offer courses leading to qualifications in library and information sciences accredited by ALIA.

These courses range from diplomas to masters degrees and very much reflect the changing nature of the profession and roles of practitioners in the 21st century. There is a growing focus on both information and knowledge management coupled with a determination by educators and industry to provide students with a deep understanding of not only the needs they serve, but also the context in which information is to be applied.

Perhaps the most significant recent development in library and information education has been the extensive review of the national library, information and cultural services sector training package completed in 2011. This review, managed by Innovation and Business Skills Australia with extensive input and support from industry, educators and ALIA, led to a set of national guidelines that have now been implemented across entry level courses for the sector.

A key change in these guidelines is the development of basic course content relevant to gallery, museum, archive, records and library technicians plus specialist units for each. Industry has welcomed this change and the resulting portability of qualifications across these closelyrelated fields, improving prospects for career advancement for technicians. ALIA-accredited diplomas in library and information studies all meet these new guidelines.

At the undergraduate level, educators are drawing out key relevancies in their courses, including both information and knowledge management skills and understanding how these work together, corporate information management, archives, and library technology. Bachelor programs must also deliver on the core competencies for the sector, preparing students with skills in the creation, collection, management and use of information.

The range of post-graduate programs in library and information education in Australia reflects the contemporary trends challenging the sector, focusing on providing students with sophisticated skills and knowledge transferable across a wide range of industries and working environments. Many of these courses include content covering political, policy and technological trends. Post-graduate options include graduate diplomas and masters level qualifications. Library and information education providers in Australia have also responded to the need for flexible study options with a wide range of online and distance education offerings. These are now available at all levels of study with excellent support from course providers.

Constant review of course content against the demands of the workplace is essential to ensuring graduates of these courses can demonstrate excellence in practice.

It is a complex task and an important responsibility. It is an ongoing task and takes time. As well as the courses shown here, ALIA is working with other educators on the path to accreditation or reaccreditation for their courses. ALIA acknowledges and commends all of these institutions and their staff for their commitment to this goal.

WHAT IS ACCREDITATION AND WHY DOES ALIA DO IT?

ALIA accredits courses that lead to eligibility for professional membership of the Association at an Associate (AALIA) and Library Technician (ALIATec) level. We work with education providers and we consult with other stakeholders, including students and employers, to ensure courses equip graduates with the core knowledge, skills and attributes they need to achieve excellence in practice. We also work collaboratively with stakeholders in course development so that new programs are developed to be relevant to the environment in which graduates will find themselves employed.

The courses listed in this publication are those with current

accreditation by ALIA at the time of publication. Each course is accredited for a recognised period and we assess them regularly to ensure currency and quality. An end accreditation date in the listing below does not mean the course will no longer be accredited, instead it indicates when accreditation will be reviewed and may be reapplied for by the institution offering that course. This list does not show previously accredited programs no longer accepting intakes and Doctors of Philosophy programs are also excluded, as the accreditation process does not cover these. We recommend you check with institutions individually to find out whether the course you are

interested in is accredited or in the process of applying for, or renewing, accreditation with ALIA.

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WHAT ARE YOUR PROSPECTS?

Wondering what the future holds for the library and information science sector in terms of employment opportunities and which qualifications will get you where you want to go? In traditional roles and workplaces, the forecast is for 'steady as she goes' - but that's not the whole story.

According to the Australian Government's Job Outlook service, prospects for library technicians are good, with little unemployment and more than half of the workers at this level working full-time. Almost 70% of gallery, library and museum technicians have completed further qualifications after school and the most frequent qualification achieved is diploma or advanced diploma level.

For library assistants, Job Outlook reports below average unemployment, however overall employment has decreased over the last five years, signalling the need

to upgrade qualifications to improve job prospects.

Employment for librarians through to 2016-17 in Australia is expected to stay steady. Job Outlook reports just over 90% of librarians have at

least post school qualifications and for around 80% of this group, the qualification achieved is a bachelor or higher degree.

Statistics can be slippery and these cautious numbers are only part of the picture. Alongside traditional roles in traditional library and information service environments

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are all the others where the library and information management skill set excels and some of these are really on the move. This group includes the information industry's service providers and allied professions, ranging from subscription agencies to website designers, where qualified library and information professionals can

be found applying their core skills to new challenges under different names. Database and information technology services are forecast by Job Outlook to grow strongly through the coming years,

for example. Educators and researchers also put those same skills to good use. There is an emerging understanding of the portable nature of the skills and training provided by library and information qualifications, backed by increasing recognition of the key role of the knowledge worker in the 21st century economy.

Job prospects depend as much on the individual as on an industry forecast. Qualifications plus experience plus adaptability seem to be the right recipe for great career prospects.

Applications are now open for the postgraduate programs in Library and Information Management or Business Information Management offered by UniSA.

These programs are blurring the boundaries and will enable librarians, record managers, archivists and business information management professionals to reinvent their careers, to keep in touch with the latest digital approaches and work in a wider skilled environment.

The programs offer you the opportunity to study at your own pace: either part-time or full-time, externally online, or face to face in Adelaide.

RECOGNITION OF PRIOR LEARNING

Formal education is only part of the education journey for any professional. Employers and educators now recognise important skills can be learned and practised in many forums, both formal and informal. Official recognition of prior learning, or RPL as it is known, is therefore critically important to professionals seeking to add further qualifications to gain promotion in the workplace.

The Tertiary Education Quality Standards Agency (TEQSA) was established in 2011 by the Federal Government to regulate and monitor the quality of Australia's higher education sector, which now incorporates public and private universities, selfaccrediting higher education providers and providers without self-accreditation. TEQSA registers and assesses higher education providers against the Australian Quality Framework (AQF), a single national qualifications framework for Australia first established and used for higher education, vocational education and training and in schools.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR THE LIBRARY AND INFORMATION SECTOR?

The AQF includes pathways based on a philosophy of understanding and recognising the role of prior learning in determining eligibility for access to post-graduate education.

The AQF provides a series of definitions of learning outcomes in terms of what graduates are expected to know, to understand, and be able to do as a result of a specific level of learning.

This system is designed to give students enrolled with higher education providers confidence in the quality and content of their courses and its ultimate applicability in the workplace.

ALIA's categories of membership now allow for acceptance of Recognition of Prior Learning Assessments from graduates who have undertaken a post-graduate library and information science qualification without holding a Bachelor Degree. In making this change ALIA recognises the specifications of the AQF and the regulatory responsibility of TEQSA to ensure quality outcomes for the higher education sector.

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FINISHED YOUR STUDIES? THINK AGAIN!

ALIA can help you keep track of all this work, so that when your performance review comes around you can provide evidence of your commitment to ongoing learning.

The MyPD tracking tool allows you to capture a record of the training you have done, conferences attended, committees you have sat on, professional reading and writing, and more. And MyPD is now available to every ALIA personal member via the ALIA website.

Personal professional associate and library technician members

can take advantage of ALIA's Professional Development (PD) Scheme and continuing members of the PD Scheme will be soon be entitled to recognition through a new level of professional membership: certified professional. Current PD Scheme members who are already certified practitioners will transition automatically to Certified Professional status from 1 July 2013.

The ALIA PD scheme requires you to consider your learning outcome/reflection for each activity and allocate PD points based on a summary of activities table. A minimum of 30 PD points each year and a total of 120 PD points over three years is required. 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YOUR PROVEN RECORD OF UNIQUE EXPERTISE

Following revising ALIA's LIS sector core knowledge, skills and attributes statement in 2012, ALIA is introducing specialisations to the PD scheme in July 2013. Specialisations will enable members to record key competencies required for different areas of specialisation in library and information practice.

The introduction of specialisations is intended to improve recognition of the unique skill sets and expertise library and information professionals in various environments have. This better aligns the LIS sector with other professions with recognised specialist learning paths, such as accountants and nurses, where registration depends on a proven record of ongoing learning.

The specialisation option will be piloted by the health library sector, starting this year. Librarians and library technicians in that sector will be able to relate their continuing professional development to an agreed list of health core competencies, leading to achieving the new ALIA membership category of Certified Professional, for example, Associate Certified Professional (Health Librarian), Library Technician Certified Professional (Health). ALIA expects to see these titles soon joined by others representing a range of specialisations, such as Certified Professional (School) or (Knowledge Management).

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WHAT'S IN A NAME⁵

Most tertiary lecturers agree some of the jobs current students will end up doing haven't been invented yet or, at the very least, the names by which they will go in their professional lives aren't vet known.

The LIS sector is a typical example. Where once we had simpler titles such as librarian, cataloguer, director, now we also have library technician, information officer, knowledge manager, and even category architect, to name but a few.

WHO DOES WHAT IN A **LIBRARY OR INFORMATION** SERVICE?

It's not as confusing as it may first appear to work out what a given iob title might mean – at least not in terms of the professional qualifications required to do it. As the peak body for the industry and the profession, the Australian Library and Information Association provides a guide to the recognised levels of competencies and appropriate work levels for the profession through its categories of membership. You can use these

guidelines to work out what you want to do if you are just getting started in the profession or what to do next if you're already working and planning for promotion. You can also use the work level auidelines to work out where a job that interests you fits in

the professional spectrum and check that it includes an appropriate level of recognition and remuneration.

ALIA awards three levels of personal membership, these being associate (professional), library technician (professional) and member, and in 2013 ALIA has

also introduced a new category of membership certified professional - available to professionals who are full members of ALIA's Professional Scheme.

Associate members are required to hold an ALIA-recognised library and

information science qualification at under-graduate or post-graduate level. Typically, librarians work at a level that includes supervising and leading staff, managing a branch library, a section of a large library, a small special library or a research

Charles Sturt University (CSU) conducts teaching and research across the information and library studies disciplines through its School of Information Studies, in fields including:

- Children's librarianship
- Teacher librarianship
- Community informatics
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- Information and knowledge management
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program. They will be designing, directing and applying services, formulating policy and providing strategic advice, managing major projects, information technology systems and applications, managing and providing leadership, and marketing their library or information service and its resources.

This category includes members with approved qualifications in teacher-librarianship (a dual education and librarianship qualification providing eligibility to work either as a professional librarian or as a teacher-librarian). Teacherlibrarianship is a specialised field that requires knowledge of curriculum and pedagogy combined with library and information management knowledge and skills.

The work of a library technician typically focuses on the operation and technical aspects of library and information services, including assistance with loan and reference queries, maintaining library resources, records and systems, interlibrary loans, the development and presentation of promotional programs for libraries and copy cataloguing and classification. At a senior level, Library Technicians also supervise library and clerical staff and manage small libraries, information services or sections in large libraries or information services.

There are many other roles in library and information services undertaken by dedicated and enthusiastic individuals who may not have, or may still be studying towards a library and information qualification. A common job title you will see at this level is that of library assistant, for whom daily tasks will probably include assisting and providing instruction to library users about resources. managing multimedia resources, and data entry. ALIA recognises these practitioners and students in the personal member category because the Association believes all individuals working in the sector are valuable contributors to their organisations and the profession and that their voice should be heard.

HOW DO I GET THERE FROM HERE?

As with any profession, many of us start with one level of qualification and undertake further study as our careers develop. ALIA encourages this through formal and informal learning and personal members can upgrade their level of membership as appropriate throughout their career. ALIA also offers Associate and Library Technician members access to a Professional Development Scheme which can be used to provide evidence of vour personal commitment to, and completion of, continuina professional development.
